



Need to Write a Thesis or Research Paper? Wondering Where/How to Begin?

First, explore the subject of the course you're taking--read the required and recommended texts, with an eye to finding a topic of interest to you. Consult your instructor for ideas. The more fascinated you are by the topic, the better your paper will be as you do the research.

A helpful first step: formulate a Research Question, That is, a question you hope will be answered, at least in part, by the paper you write. This question, which identifies

the exact aspect of the topic you want to explore, will give your professor an idea of what you plan to research and write about, and to approve it or make further suggestions. And it will help you focus your research.

For many students, the subject of a new course is at least partially unfamiliar, so they innocently select a research paper topic that is way too broad. They haven't yet done enough reading and research to understand the subject's complexities.

Suppose you're taking a course on Interreligious Dialogue. You've always been intrigued by Vatican II and its effects, so you want to incorporate that idea into your paper somehow.

Here are some possible formulations of research questions on that general course topic, interreligious dialogue, incorporating your interest in Vatican II:

"How did Vatican II affect the Catholic Church?" Too broad.

"How did Vatican II's Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity affect interreligious dialog between Muslims and Catholics in Birmingham, AL in the 1970s?" Probably way too narrow.

"How did Vatican II facilitate interreligious dialog?" Maybe just right, but could be a little too broad:

To narrow it a bit: "How has Vatican II facilitated interreligious dialog between Muslims and Christians?"

You could experience a number of problems if your topic is too broad, including:

- You find too many information sources; you're overwhelmed.
- You find information that is too general.
- Your research question lacks focus; you lose interest.
- The information you find covers a wide variety of concepts or ideas that can't be integrated into one paper. In desperation, you trail off into unnecessary tangents.

If your topic is too narrow, you won't be able to find enough information on the subject to analyze, discuss, explore and write about.

Once you think you've decided on a research question, feel free to change, alter, reformulate, modify, or expand it. Or toss it out altogether, if the topic doesn't work for you--and, if it's OK with your instructor, start afresh.


for Peace The program is scheduled to be launched in January 2025.



festivals of the year, observed throughout the Celtic lands.




"Belonging Together: Migrants, Refugees, Displaced People and Global Solidarity"

GMU is once again collaborating with Tangaza University, IRDIS, and the Harmony Institute of Kenya on a third international online conference dedicated to fostering the precepts of Pope Francis' encyclical, Fratelli Tutti. Titled, "Belonging Together: Migrants, Refugees, Displaced People, and Global Solidarity," the conference will focus on "the inseparability of the human family—people belong together regardless of their origin and residence status. At the same time, the title alludes to the irrevocable responsibility of humankind for mutual care—being human and being in solidarity with others, especially the most vulnerable, belong together."







Keynote speakers for the conference include Rev. Daniel G.
