During World Interfaith Harmony Week, February 6 - 8, 2025. GMU is once again collaborating with Tangaza University, IRDIS, and the Harmony Institute of Kenya on a third international online conference dedicated to fostering the precepts of Pope Francis' encyclical, Fratelli Tutti. Titled "Belonging Together: Migrants, Refugees, Displaced People, and Global Solidarity," the conference will focus on "the inseparability of the human family—people belong together regardless of their origin and residence status. At the same time, the title alludes to the irrevocable responsibility of humankind for mutual care—being human and being in solidarity with others, especially the most vulnerable, belong together."

Topics will explore:

- How do migrant experiences shape the understanding of human existence?
- How can migrants help define practices of mutual care for the common good?
- What role do migrants play in establishing shared values for peaceful

Discussions will include:

Being Human--Being Migrant

- Migrants' identity, resilience and agency
- Negotiating migrant self-understanding, reception, and integration in host communities
- Gendered migration experiences and transnational belonging

Living Together in the Age of Migration

- Caring for One Another
- Hospitality and practices of inclusive community by and with migrants
- Migration, border politics, citizenship, and nation-building, using legal framework in concert with the United Nations Global Compact
- International migration, mobility, families, and community engagement

Ethical Principles and Shared Values for Shaping Migrant-Sensitive Societies

- Moral obligations toward refugees and vulnerable migrants
- Protecting migrant women, children, and unaccompanied minors, equipping them for self-reliant futures
- Interfaith solidarity, human dignity, and human rights for peaceful societies

President Grudzen to Visit Nigeria




The <u>Ufuk Dialogue Foundation</u> in Nigeria has invited President Grudzen to speak at three interfaith conferences from February 20-25, 2025, in diverse areas of Nigeria. The theme of these meetings will be "Empowering Youth and Cultivating a Culture of Understanding." Ufuk Dialogue Foundation of Nigeria creates a platform for peace and dialogue for academic circles in Nigeria. This foundation is part of the global Hizmet movement which was founded in Turkey but has now spread to many countries in Africa and throughout the world. GMU has worked closely with the Harmony Foundation in Kenya (another Hizmet organization) for the past decade on interfaith education projects. The topic of his talks will be "Youth, Global Solidarity, and Citizenship."

Marita Grudzen has also been invited to present at the conferences. However, because of health concerns surrounding extended travel, Marita will be meeting with women in interfaith groups via Zoom.

Librarian's Corner



When Age Matters: Paying Attention to Dates of the Sources You Use

You're researching a topic in preparation for writing a paper or thesis, and you find a scholarly article that's on target for your topic. But—wait a minute. It was published in 1967. Is that OK? Well, it all

depends. The answer is: maybe, but probably not.

Obviously, if your topic covers one of the sciences, medicine, or technology, you should ignore anything published prior to the last 4-5 years (on our online databases, you can limit the search by publication date.) Unless, that is, you're writing about developmental trends in that discipline over the decades or centuries.

If you're writing about a historical topic, the source might be an important one, even if it was written long ago. But realize that concepts and understandings evolve over time, even in fields like history, philosophy, literature and theology. Insights into, and interpretations of, for example, the Gospel of Luke or the writings of Erasmus may have moved in new directions since the 1960s. Documents and manuscripts which shed new light on the subject may have been recently discovered.

Citing recent sources also signals to your readers that you've kept up to date with current trends in research. You want to show your familiarity with the latest books and articles on your topic—that you're a vibrant part of the contemporary discourse.

Additionally, an older source might include information that's outdated, or

research that has since been debunked or disputed. You might, however, want to include that outdated theory or idea, with clear reference to more recent research that shows its inaccuracies.

If you're using a website as a source, watch out! Websites are often not maintained; people start a website with excellent intentions, then ignore it for years. Check to see when it was last updated.

To sum up: Pay attention to those publication dates! Good scholarly work should strike a balance between newer sources for up-to-date information and older sources to establish a broader context or track the development of a field.




